The Rebecca House

On October 23, Rebecca Khasoa cut the ribbon and the people literally danced their way onto the grounds of "The Rebecca House" in Kakamega, Kenya! Twelve treadle sewing machines are now set up in the building, along with 2 overlock machines and a knitting machine. The tables and chairs are in place and the tailoring classes have begun. If God allows we will bring some ladies from Bellevue in March to encourage the women at the house. They have bigger plans for the future including classes on raising chickens and goats, table banking, small business skills and of course, discipleship!



The impact of an ocean-going container full of bibles!

This is a recent email from pastor Christiano Mboyi in the village of Kenyenya, Kenya:

"Last week, I've been training our young evangelists how to present the gospel in a simple way to younger generations in both primary & high schools... We reached over 15 schools, distributed 4600 bibles and saw many pupils pray to ask Jesus into their lives in response to the gospel. I also encouraged the schools' teachers to be using the Bibles during CRE or pastoral programs during Bible clubs sessions. This will see the students discipled by them. This was a life

changing experience for our young ministers in our Training Center."

Pastor Chris is training young men and women for gospel ministry. We are currently working on a plan to bring a Vo-Tech training center to the Kenyenya School of Ministry, starting with welding classes. We have a grant that will match your donations up to half the total cost of the project. The project plan for land, building, startup capital and first year operating capital is just over \$23K. If you are looking for a good place to make an investment in furthering the gospel in Kenya, THIS MIGHT BE IT!

Pastor Harrison's church is situated in the Tassia neighborhood of Nairobi. That area is basically one step above the Mathare and Kibera slums. For many of his members, economic security is unknown. Twenty three members of his church attended one of two basic business courses conducted by SOMO Africa. SOMO Africa is indigenously Kenyan and is striving to make a difference in the economic life of a country where 35% of the people live in poverty and 80% of the jobs are in the 'informal sector', meaning individuals with small businesses. The East Africa Project piloted these two courses in Tassia and will be seeking to expand to Mathare, Kenyenya and Kakamega.




Planning for what's next

As young people in Kenya feel led to gospel ministry they often face a significant challenge. Where can they go to obtain holistic and hands-on pastoral training that equips them with ministry training, yet also provides them with income-generating skills to sustain them? It is likely that the local churches and communities where they will serve will not have the resources and capacity to support them. Most pastors and other ministers in Kenya must also hold down a full-time job. This hurdle has caused many would-be pastors to abandon their theological training to pursue gainful employment. Those that do continue as pastors do so with very little biblical scholarship. It is estimated that as many as 80% of rural Kenyan churches are led by untrained pastors who often have only high-school formal education or lower.

One of our ministry friends, Wade Akins, has begun adding vocational training to their existing pastoral training schools. With his blessing, we are

proposing to follow his model in the village of Kenyenya, Kenya where Pastor Christiano Mboyi has started a school of ministry. The plan calls for Vo-Tech training in welding, tailoring, basic computer skills, barbering/hair styling and small business skills. The total cost for Phase I will run around \$23K which includes purchasing some land they are currently leasing, building a welding pavilion, outfitting the school with the needed materials and operating it for one year (paying the teachers and an administrator). The plan is for the school to generate



enough income after one year to be self-sustaining. We have a supporter who will match your donation up to 50% of the total cost of the center! Your partnership will not only equip young men and women to support themselves, but more importantly give them the theological foundation to teach the gospel and make disciples!

Other projects in 2021

- Provided a baptistry pool for Pastor Samson's church in Turbo.
- Assisted Pastor Samson with construction of rental housing on his property to provide additional income.
- Provided new cooking utensils for the school in Tassia run by Christine, the wife of Pastor Harrison.
- Attended the "Global Missions Strategy Workshop" put on by the 410 Bridge.
- Susan & I travelled to Kenya in July to meet with some of our partners in Nairobi and to connect with the IMB missionaries there, specifically Baron & Jackie Muga and Lauren Milewski.
- Met with a company in the US. to discuss the potential of selling items made by the ladies at The Rebecca House. This is likely a longer term project.
- Provided funds for some ministry expenses for the church in Kissi.
